Through GIFT, Lilly Endowment is encouraging local individuals and businesses to contribute to or create permanent unrestricted endowment funds to benefit their local communities. These funds will provide grant support for local programs and projects affecting the lives of local residents. These grants will be chosen by local volunteers to best serve their local communities."

For a limited time, gifts made to the Clay County, Sullivan County or Vigo County community grant fund will be matched \$1 for \$1 by the Endowment. Gifts will also be matched if the donor wants to create a new unrestricted endowment fund bearing the donor's name.

As long as matching funds remain available, donors giving \$5,000, \$10,000 or \$50,000 may create an unrestricted endowment fund in their family name that has \$10,000, 20,000 or \$100,000 respectively in it. When the conference came to an end, I was both exhausted and energized, definitely motivated and inspired, and no longer underwhelmed, but quite positively overwhelmed!"







Seeking Women Who Care and Guys Who Give!

In their brief existence, our philanthropic organizations, 100+ Women Who Care and Guys Who Give, have made an immediate and lasting impact on Vigo County nonprofits. Both groups are ready to renew memberships for 2015 and hopefully add new members to increase their impact in the community.

Since its formation in 2013, 100+ Women Who Care have made donations of \$162,000. The organizations that have received one of the quarterly contributions are: Art Spaces, CANDLES Museum, Catholic Charities, Council on Domestic Abuse, Ivy Tech Foundation for the Terre Haute Humane Society, the Swope Art Museum, United Campus Ministries and the United Way's Success by Six program.

In its first year, Guys Who Give has already provided over \$55,000 to Catholic Charities, CHANCES for Youth, Vigo County Education Foundation and the West Vigo Community Center. The Guys have also voted to contribute their 2015 membership endowment contribution to a new unrestricted "Guys Who Give" Community Fund which will leverage matching contributions under GIFT Phase VI.

Those donations are in addition to funding endowments the groups have created for long-term giving in the Wabash Valley Community Foundation.

The two organizations have a similar operation. Members agree to donate \$100 toward the endowment fund and to contribute \$100 to the nonprofit organizations selected at each of four quarterly meetings. At each meeting, members can nominate a nonprofit

organization. Three finalists are chosen at random, and the members making those nominations are given five minutes each to promote the organization. The finalist receiving the most votes is awarded the \$100 donation from each member.

These two groups have already inspired the formation of other 100 Women or Men's groups in Brazil, Greencastle and Lafayette.

Supporting Building of Historic Log School in Fowler Park

Situated in Fowler Park's Pioneer Village, a newly built log schoolhouse serves as a reminder of the roots of public education in Vigo County. The building was partially funded through a grant from Wabash Valley Community Foundation.

The one-room schoolhouse, measuring 22 feet by 18 feet, was sponsored by the Educational Heritage Association Inc. of Vigo County, a not-for-profit organization. It sits among the Village's log cabins, log barn, smokehouse and blacksmith shop representing Indiana life in the 19th century.

The Association's project was nine years in the making. Retired Vigo County Parks superintendent Keith Ruble designed and physically built the schoolhouse. It took about seven weeks to build the log and wood structure. Ruble said the building will help today's children appreciate learning.

Many of the characteristics of the log schoolhouse are authentic to the 1830s period represented by the Pioneer Village. As in that period, it has a porch, heat supplied by a fireplace, and shingles made of wood. Its size is authentic to the period. Benches with no backs will be installed, and individual slates, which pioneer children used to write on, will be added.

At the October dedication, which was held during Fowler Park's Pioneer Days, Community Foundation Board president Fred Nation spoke on the importance of preserving our historical heritage as it relates to education. The \$4,225 grant in support of the project was from three unrestricted funds – the Henry and Geraldine Adelman Memorial Fund, the Landsbaum Endowment Fund and the Lilly Endowment Board Designated Fund.
